For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind.


But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating, for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy and its people as a delight.

DECEMBER SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

12/4 Matthew 3:1-12

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah

spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'" Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abra-

ham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. "I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

12/11 Luke 1:46-55


And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

12/18 Matthew 1:18-25

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child

from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she

had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.



In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Visitors: Lynn Hollstein; Wendy Kosakowski | Mary-K opened the meeting at 7:01 pm with Pastor Chris giving the opening prayer.

The first order of business was to approve the pass through payments for October.

A MOTION WAS MADE AND SECONDED TO APPROVE THE PASS THROUGH PAYMENTS FOR \$335.00. THE MOTION PASSED.

Preschool Report

Wendy Kosakowski presented an overview on improvements to the Church facilities, which are also used by the preschool. Wendy has received approval of a grant for church facilities improvement in the amount of \$37,399.80. One of the requirements was that church facilities improved under the grant had to be spaces that the preschool uses—new toilets, partitions, touchless faucets, and new paint for the ladies restroom, and new LED lights. It also included a new vanity in the nursery, stripping and waxing of floors in Fellowship Hall, preschool, and restrooms. Wendy asked that the Trustees pick out the paint colors for the women's restroom. The updating of facilities must be completed by the end of May 2023. Updating of facilities will start as soon as the funding arrives. The total amount of the grant was for \$92,000.

Questions were asked about why three bids were not taken for the work on the project. Lauri Hubach asked what the \$54K preschool portion of the grant would be used for–air purifiers, Google Chromebooks, with a \$10K bonus per teacher, which includes hazard pay and sick pay. A discussion ensued on hazard pay and a comparison to what another preschool had put aside for hazard pay, sick pay, bonuses, and use of bonuses. Mary-K encouraged us to communicate with each other and work together for the betterment of St. Peter's and the preschool. We should encourage transparency and communication.

Trustee Report (Trustee Minutes 11/15/22)

Attendance: Jim Kubuske, Pastor Chris Buckingham-Taylor, Edgar Vargas, Geoff Gatz, Don Krucek.

Jim took a moment to thank all the trustees for their hard work.

- -Outside Advent Wreath needs to be set up before 11/27. Don and Jim will meet on 11/19 at 2pm to set it up. Edgar volunteered that it was very easy, and that he would start bringing parts up during the week, this week.
- Boy Scouts will set up the Christmas tree on Monday, 11/21 at 7 pm. They will return on 12/9 to take it down and put it away.

- Jim chaperoned the Boy Scout Eagle Court of Honor on 11/6. All went well, they have done it enough times that they have it down to a science. Jim asked for volunteers for the next Eagle Court of Honor on 12/3, with no one volunteering, Jim will chaperone.
- Geisel repaired the problematic boiler part. There was no charge for the visit, and a discount for the part due to our maintenance agreement. In total, it was less than \$500. Geoff mentioned that there is some water near it, but Edgar said because of the type it is, this is normal.
- Edgar said that he turned his bids in to Wendy for the grant she is writing, and he believes she has turned in the grant. Geoff raised the question of who will oversee these repairs, and whether it is a trustee issue. Pastor Chris said let's wait to see if it gets approved first.
- There is a work order to set up 4 tables and corresponding chairs on Dec. 10 for the Advent Workshop on Dec 11, and then to put the tables and chairs back so the Fellowship Hall is ready for preschool on Monday. Don and Gary will set up and take down at 2 pm on Saturday and a time TBD on Sunday.

Geoff Gatz had several things to report:

- The contract with Republic has been signed. It will cost \$54/month for the single bin. No more recycling. There will be a set up cost of \$154.
- The last windstorm caused a shingle and a shutter to fall off the parsonage. There is no water leak. Shutter is in the garage.
- He raised concerns about people parked in the lot when Born comes to push snow. Edgar pointed out that in the past, they usually move.
- Gary called Callahan and the outside light that was on at the wrong time has been fixed.
- Brian, with the help of Geoff and Tom Janus, was able to bring the low voltage wire to the electronic sign. Jim will contact Wagner Sign to find out about the key to open the sign so it can be attached.
- Geoff asked the group who will continue to be a trustee. Gary will continue depending on health and Don.
- Geoff Gatz resigned as a trustee.

Next meeting 12/15/22.

After review of the Trustee Report, Council was informed there may still be members interested in becoming Trustees. We are hopeful that in the near future we will be adding additional Trustee members.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Chris thanked everyone who helped with the Christmas decorations.

The organist will be having a choir rehearsal on Thursday for a 12/11/22 choir singing performance. The bell choir will also be performing during Advent.

Church services will be held on Wednesday, 12/21/22, at 7:00 pm for Blue Christmas. On Saturday, 12/24/22, at 7:00 pm there will be a Christmas Eve service. On Sunday, 12/25/22, there will be a Christmas Day service at 10:00 am.

Financial Secretary's Report

Offerings for October 2022 were \$13,811.24. Year-to-date offerings for 2022 were \$119,531.00. Pledge cards submitted in 2022 were for \$87,598.00—so far we have collected \$82,678.32 against pledges. Becky commented that for 2023 she has received 36 pledge cards for \$81,450. Our goal for 2023 is \$205,000. It was mentioned we should add a graphic thermometer to The Key to keep track of our progress of the value of pledge cards submitted to the goals we have set. Pastor Chris will have Kaye add this illustration to The Key. Everyone is urged to turn in their pledge cards before the end of December.

Spiritual Life

Pastor Chris reported the group is still doing home visits, sharing communion, and bringing gifts to the homebound. Pastor Chris thanked Judy and Pam for their time and the gifts they bring to those they call on.

Altar Guild

Lynn Hollstein reported on Altar Guild activities. There will be a communion service this Sunday. The other communion date for December will be at the Christmas Eve service at 7:00~pm on 12/24/22.

Ushers

New Business

Mary-K asked the Council if we thought it was necessary to have a December Council meeting. The consensus was there were not enough issues to have a December meeting and it would be difficult to get everyone together for a meeting during Christmas week. Therefore, there will be no Council Meeting in December. However, there will be an Executive Committee meeting on the second Monday, 12/12/22, to handle any business that needs to be addressed in December.

Pastor Chris commented he would like to schedule a Council retreat in January. It would take place in Fellowship Hall from about 9:30 am to 12 noon on a Saturday to be named.

Kaye Koler mentioned that she and Teri Walter are giving out "Quilts of Valor" to veterans in our congregation on January 15, 2023.

Pastor Chris gave the closing prayer.
