

JANUARY SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

1/2 John 1:1-18

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

(John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.'") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

1/9 Luke 3:15-21

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people. But Herod the ruler, who had been rebuked by him because of Herodias, his brother's wife, and because of all the evil things that Herod had done, added to them all by shutting up John in prison.

Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened.

1/16 John 2:1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

1/23 Luke 4:14-30

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone. When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" He said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Doctor, cure yourself!' Committee Reports

President/Moderators: Mary-K gave a report on the President/Moderator meetings going forward. The three moderators and Pastor Chris will meet once a month. The days and times are still to be determined.

Altar Guild: Pastor Chris requested that Altar Guild members assist him on Tuesday, 12/21/21 at 10:00 a.m. in the sanctuary with arranging candles on the altar for the Blue Christmas service.

Ushers: Mary-K indicated that Allen Murphy was doing a good job recruiting new members for the ushers.

Tech Team: It was brought up that Daniel Jacky is pre-recording music to be used in the copies of the services that are posted online, instead of using the real-time recordings. The cost of these recordings is \$150.00 per hour. The question posed was, do we want to continue the pre-recording at this cost? This will be reviewed and discussed at a future meeting.

Mary-K indicated Brian is using loaned equipment. Mary-K also asked if we need to purchase our own new or used equipment? This issue will continue to be studied.

Old Business:

The new electronic sign is now working. Brian Schieferstein still wants to have a hard line installed. Pastor Chris thanked Geoff and Linda Gatz who did the landscaping around the sign.

Becky Woods asked about the Little Church offerings and loose offerings received. Lauri suggested that the Little Church offerings be credited to the Improvement Fund.

A motion was made to direct funds received in the Little Church to the Improvement Fund. It was seconded and passed.

Pastor Chris suggested that the loose change offerings be directed to the general fund. Becky indicated that she is currently using the general fund as the account for loose change offerings.

Becky indicated that she had cleaned out the 6,000 pennies from the large jar in the rear of the church and converted that into a \$60.00 check. Pastor Chris suggested that this amount be paid to Circle Six to use to pay for donuts and coffee for coffee hour.

Becky Woods asked about the clothing donations that are currently deposited in the Walker Lobby. Instead of transporting the clothes to another location, she suggested that we distribute them from the church. It was suggested that the garage be used as a point of distribution, possibly on Saturdays. Becky and Sue Conkle will speak with Diane Barnum about this proposal and they will decide what to do.

Pastor Chris gave a closing prayer and the meeting ended at 8:16 pm.
