



5/1 Acts 9:1-20

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called

Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God."





MAY SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

5/8 Acts 9:36-43

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

5/15 Revelation 20:11-15, 21:1-8

Then I saw a great white throne and the one who sat on it; the earth and the heaven fled from his presence, and no place was found for them. And I saw the dead, great and small, standing before the throne, and books were opened. Also another book was opened, the book of life. And the dead were judged according to their works, as recorded in the books. And the sea gave up the dead that were in it, Death and Hades gave up the dead that were in them, and all were judged according to what they had done. Then Death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire. This is the second death, the lake of fire; and anyone whose name was not found written in the book of life was thrown into the lake of fire.

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth: for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them as their God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." Then he said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life. Those who conquer will inherit these things, and I will be their God and they will be my children. But as for the cowardly, the faithless, the polluted, the murderers, the fornicators, the sorcerers, the idolaters, and all liars, their place will be in the lake that burns with fire and sulfur, which is the second death."

5/22 Acts 16:9-15

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and

help us." When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them. We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

5/29 Acts 16:16-34

One day, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation." She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour. But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace before the authorities. When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, "These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe." The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted in a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. Then he brought them outside and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" They answered, "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.

Mission and Outreach, St. Elizabeth Center

For those that don't know, and as a reminder to others, St. Peter's has had an ongoing mission and outreach that started in downtown Lorain at Catholic Charities. Originally, this was a place that provided hot meals for the homeless, and our church helped once a month.

Back then, Lynn and Tom Hollstein were in charge of cooking a spaghetti meal and then delivering the meal. Others from our church would bring desserts. Members who have served in the past and today include Pam Miskov, Judy McCurdy, Betty Pekare, Diane Barnum, Danielle Nagy, Margaret Wiegand, Ken and Cindy Bring, Beverly Mischka, and Serita Reyes. (apologies if we've omitted anyone)

Years later, the place downtown closed and opened St. Elizabeth Center (still in Lorain), which was originally the old Polish Club. The Center serves daily hot meals to the homeless, and up to 50 men who

shelter there, with a focus on supporting those with special needs.

Dave Rice, a member of the Lions Club got the "Leos" involved. They help the 3rd Wednesday of every month from 4:30-6:00 p.m. One girl, Jasmine (a Leo), actually was flying to Costa Rico at 3:00 a.m. that morning, and she was still there to help out. Trustee Report

Mary-K asked if there were any questions for Jim Kubuske concerning the Trustee Report, as submitted below:

Trustee Meeting 4/19/22

Attendance: Pastor Chris Buckingham-Taylor, Jim Kubuske, Geoff Gatz, Gary Thompson, Edgar Vargas.

Old Business:

The original chimney guy is unable to do the chimney above the offices, referred us to Adam Bartlett, Silverton Enterprises, 1104 Milan Ave., Amherst 216-389-1811. Cost estimate is \$3000, will need council approval, so Jim will present it at the Council Meeting on Monday.

Still no response from the city on occupancy of rooms.

Gary put in solar lights around the flagpole so that we don't have to go in and out of parsonage area to turn it on or repair it.

New Business:

Work Orders:

Preschool hallway light needed a new ballast which Edgar replaced at no cost to the church Preschool bathroom stall needed a latch replaced. Gary used one from another area and fixed it.

Gary contacted Maxim elevator about light and it will be fixed next time elevator man comes.

Dumpster: Geoff and the finance committee have researched and once our contract is up with Rumpke we will remove the recycling dumpster and add a larger dumpster with Republic at a cost of 57/m onth. We must make sure we contact Rumpke within 60-120 days of Jan 1 to cancel our contract.

Phones: Geoff and the finance committee are asking council to approve \$2,995 for the fire panel, remove the landlines and convert phones to the internet. They will begin to save the church money after $1\ 1/2$ years. (Rebman systems)

Garden club: when the club was originally set up, trustees specified that any change or charges are to be run past trustees for approval. The mulch should be by donations of mulch or money.

Pastor Chris would like to have many of the plaques and pictures that have been removed hung around the church. He will discuss it with Edgar and then trustees will move forward.

Geoff discussed the wooden preschool sign. He asked the city if it could be on the corner and the city said as long as it wasn't blocking the right of way.

Geoff questioned mowing. Cost is per week, with 1 mow a week. At this point it was also asked about the equipment, the mower, blower, inside vacuum, etc. All equipment is the property of Zigmer maintenance.

Geoff questioned the \$50 cleaning fee after an event in the church. Discussion followed as to what denotes a "Special Event" and it was determined that Trustees will decide what signifies a special event.

Geoff asked the trustees for ideas to reduce costs. One thing that was mentioned was the Cintas contract, which will cost us to get out of, so we will revisit before the contract is up November 2024.

Next meeting, Thursday, May 1, 2022, still on Zoom.

Toward the end of the council meeting, motions for two Trustee projects were made.

A MOTION WAS MADE AND SECONDED FOR CHIMNEY REPAIRS AT \$3,000, UPON RECEIPT OF A WRITTEN QUOTE FOR THE PROJECT. THE MOTION PASSED.

A MOTION WAS MADE AND SECONDED TO ACCEPT REBMAN'S BID TO UPGRADE THE FIRE PANEL SYSTEM (\$2,995). THE MOTION PASSED.

Jessie Kubuske suggested that we use the funds from the Little Church to fund Trustee capital projects.

Treasurer's Report

Lauri Hubach was not able to attend the meeting but she submitted the financial reports with the following highlights:

A MOTION WAS MADE AND SECONDED TO APPROVE THE PASS THROUGH PAYMENTS. THE MOTION PASSED.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Chris stated he is working with the Budget/Finance Committee to find a replacement for Daniel Jacky. At this time we do not have a replacement. A question was raised if we were interested in candidates for organist? Pastor Chris stated we want candidates but at this time we are not hiring. In the interim we will be using the music in the Red Hymnal.

Pastor Chris indicated that questions may arise about what will happen with the church in 2 years. He stressed that we need to be grateful for our current contributions and steady pledge income, and that we have a lot of positive things going. He stated that next year's budget will be more balanced and the Finance Committee will make recommendations when the time is right. Most importantly, we want to continue our good trends.

President and Moderator's Report

Mary-K stated that we are moving forward on the right track. She also wanted to thank all of the volunteers, who do such good work.

Tech Report

Mary-K is looking for 1 or 2 volunteers to work as substitutes for her and also for Brian Schieferstein so that she and Brian may take a Sunday off when needed. Any interested persons should contact Mary-K.

Financial Secretary Report

Becky Woods gave the Financial Secretary's report. March total offerings were \$12,672.64. Becky stated that this Sunday, and possibly next, the collection basket for mulch will be again set out to collect contributions.

Financial Team

Geoff Gatz briefed the council on the proposed conversion of the current telephone system of landlines to internet-based phone lines with the exception of the phone in the elevator, which must stay a landline. All of this is contingent upon updating the "fire panel to use internet and cell monitoring capabilities." The group

is also looking at doing away with the recycling dumpster, converting to a larger trash dumpster, and switching from Rumke to Republic Services. This is ongoing based on timing with the end of the Rumpke contract.

The Team is still working on their analysis of the Cintas contract, which will not be up until November 2024.

The copy machine contract is also being reviewed. That contract will not be up until April, 2023.

Members of the Financial Team are Geoff Gatz, Brian Schieferstein, Shelley Harmych, Lou Zeller, Tom Hollstein, and Neil Walsilk. In a future meeting the Team will meet with Sally Readinger. Also, there will be a meeting scheduled with the Financial Team, Lauri Hubach, and the congregation, which will take place in the sanctuary.

Spiritual Life

Pastor Chris and the Spiritual Life committee will be reviewing the membership rolls. The team is also visiting retirement homes, but due to Covid, they are doing visits less often for some residents. Linda Gatz stated that she is making prayer quilt cloths for people to carry in their pockets or purses. Pastor Chris will set up a display in the sanctuary for people to offer prayers.

Altar Guild

Lynn Hollstein stated that in May we will be using a new method of preparing the communion, which will be more cost effective.

Ushers No formal report was given.

Garden Team


