NOVEMBER SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

11/6 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here.

Let no one deceive you in any way; for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you?

But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.

Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

11/13 Isaiah 65:17-25

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind. But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating; for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight. I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress. No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime; for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed. Trustee Report

In attendance: Jim Kubuske, Don Krucek, Gary Thompson, Geoff Gatz, Edgar Vargas

Air conditioning has been installed in the preschool. Screens are stored in preschool storeroom.

Sharon Thompson reported that 2 people (Joan Whitman and Taylor Stumpkowski) have volunteered to be "event managers" in the event that neither Circle Six nor Trustees are available to monitor events in the Fellowship Hall.

Trustees voted to go ahead with fall check up from Geisel since it is part of our pre-paid maintenance.

Geoff reported that Born's price for snow removal is a good price since they actually get out of the truck and shovel walkways. \$217/push, which includes salt. If they come to just salt it is \$75.

The church received a donation of \$200 from the Wesley wedding. They used our parking lot for overflow parking for their backyard reception. It did not affect parking for the funeral in the morning.

Jim has called Callahan repeatedly to come fix the outside light that is on at the wrong times. No reply.

The Boy Scout Eagle court of honor on October 15 and reception after went smoothly. All was cleaned up after. There will be another Eagle court of honor on November 6.

Geoff, Gary and Linda scraped and repainted the windows to the front southeast door to basement. It is cleaned and usable. The northeast door is not usable at this time due to structural issues.

It was decided to get a 4 cubic yard receptacle from Republic services, as long as it has a lock. (there will be more than enough keys for the church groups to use it) Recycling bin will be removed. It will cost us about \$60 a month plus fees. They will remove trash every other week. If it is found that a 4 cubic yard bin is not big enough, they will revisit getting a 6 cubic yard. If we need extra pick ups it is \$50 per pick up.

Wendy (preschool) is working on a grant toward improvements to the church and preschool, and has asked for quotes to help her with the grant writing. They are planning on LED lights, touchless faucets, a new vanity in the nursery where the children wash their hands each morning, new stalls in the restroom and hall and classrooms painted. Edgar is bidding on these things, and there will be other bids submitted. Thank you Lauri Hubach for the heads up on this grant!

Geoff has had Stonehenge Restoration come and look at the facades below the windows of the preschool, and the foundation issues around the front steps. He is waiting on a bid. They will also be contacting the company that did the restoration on Central School for their input.

A question was asked by council about using the kitchen for a spaghetti dinner. As long as there is no grease it is ok to use. There is no fire suppression unit for emitting grease smoke to the outside. Trustees are curious if the church can do dinners for people outside the church, do they need the health department ok?

Boy Scouts will be coming on Monday, November 21 to put up the Christmas tree. 2 tree bags will be purchased before that time to replace the old cardboard boxes that are disintegrating. The tree is so large it needs two.

The trustees will set up a time at their next meeting to set up the outside lighted advent wreath before November 27.

Next meeting, Thursday, November 17.

Mary-K asked if there were any questions and if we would accept the Trustee Report. Tom Hollstein asked if we need a food inspection if we have community meals at the church. Mary-K suggested that the Trustee's check

to find the answer to the question that was raised. Consensus amongst the group was to accept the Trustee Report.

Pastor's Report

The annual congregational meeting will be held on November 20, 2022 after the church service. After the annual meeting, in Fellowship Hall there will be representatives from various church groups and members can review the programs and sign up to be part of the groups.

Pastor discussed options for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services. It was decided that there will be a Saturday Christmas Eve evening service at 7:00 pm. There will be a 11:00 pm service at the Brownhelm UCC for those who wish to attend at that time. On Christmas day there will be a shared service (combined St. Peter's and Brownhelm UCC) at St. Peter's in Amherst. The following Sunday, January 1, 2023, there will be a live service at St. Peter's. All those present agreed to make this a live service.

A change to the By-Laws will be distributed to the membership incorporating the clarifying language for the role and duties of the Past President on Council, as listed below:

"The Past President shall be added as a voting member to Church Council for a one year term, with primary duty being Chair of Personnel Committee. The Past President would act as Chair of Church Council only when the President and or Vice-President are unable to lead or attend the Church Council meeting."

This change will be presented at the annual meeting for approval.

A motion was made to accept the change to the By-Laws to add the role of the Past President as follows: "The Past President shall be added as a voting member to Church Council for a one year term, with primary duty being Chair of Personnel Committee. The Past President would act as Chair of the Church Council only when the President and or Vice-President are unable to lead or attend the Church Council meeting." The motion was seconded and the motion passed.

President's Report

Mary-K reported that she is smoothly moving forward with all contacts.

Treasurer's Report

We reviewed a few minor changes to the budget and preschool budget. Sally reported that they (Sally and Lauri Hubach) had met with Wendy Kosakowski and her PTO President regarding a few changes to the preschool budget and to show the preschool budget as \$0 (fundraising vs. expenses) at the end of the 2022/2023 preschool year. We then discussed what process should be followed for preschool additional requests for funds. The consensus was if additional funds are needed, the preschool should submit their request to the Assistant Treasurer. Council will also appoint a council member to be the liaison between Council and the preschool. Mary-K will continue to attend preschool board meetings as liaison through the end of December 2022. Once the new Council is installed, a new person will be appointed.

Pastor Chris suggested that in 2024 the annual meeting to elect officers and council members be held in January and the annual budget be presented to the congregation at that time. Also, we discussed compiling a pro forma budget by June so that the church budget and preschool budget can be reconciled. At the

end of the discussion a consensus was reached to accept the presented budget reports.

Spiritual Life

The group recently had a meeting and each person on the committee is sending cards, taking gift bags, and telephoning members.

Altar Guild

Nothing new to report other than the Altar Guild still needs volunteers.

Ushers

Mary-K reported that Al Murphy had advised her that we have enough ushers at this time.

Tech Team

Mary-K stated that she was informed that when someone is speaking at the lectern the audio on electronic media is fine but if the walkabout microphone is used, the audio goes in and out. Mary-K will pass this issue on to Brian.

Garden Team

The problematic evergreen on the north side of the building was taken care of. Sue Conkle said there are still some areas that need to be cleaned out in the near future.

Nominating Committee

Christine reported that they have one new confirmed Trustee and one candidate for Secretary and also possibly another candidate. The committee has one nominee for Vice-President.

Reading of Announcements for November

Mary-K will ask Jessie Kubuske if she will be able to read the announcements for November.

Ukraine Family

Linda Gatz reported that she recently took the family shopping for winter clothes. She noted that November 13 is Hlib's birthday and suggested that we all send birthday cards to him. Linda stated that there will be a PotLuck dinner after the 12/04/22 church service. At that time, they will present Nataliia with her quilt and Linda reminded each attendee to bring an ornament of theirs for the Ukraine family's tree. Linda will also purchase the tablecloths, plates, and utensils.

Miscellaneous


