Pastaral Panderings From the desk of PASTOR CHRIS

"WALK IN ALL HIS WAYS"

ith the news and subsequent pageantry revolving around the death and burial of Queen Elizabeth in September, I have been contemplating her impact on us. Even though

"Her Majesty" was not "Our" Majesty, she does leave us all a legacy of the value of "Duty!"

The original meaning of the word "duty" was to "give or receive," but it also means to "hold." Whatever you thought of Queen Elizabeth, I hope you are at least able to value that she put her duty to God and Country before all else. Her legacy is that of how to establish priorities. Most of us, including the Queen's own family, want to be the top priority. The

unspoken thinking is—"Duty to Myself, first!" Afterall, if we don't take care of ourselves, then who will? By putting God and Country before herself, and her own interests, Queen Elizabeth embodied the idea of "Duty." The text below from Deuteronomy asks us **"What does God require of you?"** In other words: What is our duty? We absolutely have a duty to ourselves to live with honor and integrity. As

Christians, we have a duty to love one another as Christ loved us." If married, you have a duty to honor and support your partner or spouse. If you are a parent, you have a duty to your children to provide shelter, love, protection and nurture. As an individual, you have a duty to take care of yourself, your family, friends and community, which includes our nation.

Jesus not only taught us about the love of God, but also how to

reprioritize our lives. Christ taught us through word and deed, to **put God first!** And one of the ways in which we put God first is to <u>take care of</u> <u>the needs of the poor and vulnerable</u>. Serving the

"So now, O Israel, what does the Lord your God require of you? Only to fear the Lord your God, to walk in all his ways, to love him, to serve the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul."

DEUTERONOMY 10:12



needs of the entire community is one of the ways we show our love and duty to God. What does God require of us?

I imagine that, as part of Queen Elizabeth's prayer life, she asked herself—"What does God require of me today?" Her position as Monarch required different responses to that question than you or I. While we are all to put God first, how we do that depends on where we are in life. What God requires of all of us is faithfulness, to love God with all our heart and soul. How we do that, **how we demonstrate our love for God is different for all of us.** We all have different skills and abilities, and our positions in life provide us with <u>unique opportunities to serve God</u>.

Queen Elizabeth served God as the Monarch of Great Britain. You and I have different positions, we are not Kings and Queens, but our duty is the same. Whether Monarch or commoner, **our duty is to God and to the welfare of all our brothers and sisters in Christ**. Jesus taught us to serve and love one another as servants. May we rediscover the power of our duty to God this October as we consider the ways in which God might use us in St. Peter's UCC to spread God's glory. Our **Nominating Committee may be presenting you with an opportunity to serve** and love God with all your heart and soul, by serving on a committee that you may not have considered before. In the end, our purpose is the sameto love and serve God with our whole being.

Duty, to give and to receive. May we give ourselves to the service of God and in doing so, may we receive the service of others.

Remember, you are loved!

لَيْنَ OCTOBER SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

10/2 Luke 17:5-10

The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" The Lord replied, "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you. "Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink'? Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!'"

10/9 Luke 17:11-19

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

10/16 Luke 18:1-8

Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, 'Grant me justice against my opponent.' For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, 'Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming.'" And the Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

10/23 Luke 18:9-14

He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."

10/30 Luke 19:1-10

He entered Jericho and was passing through it. A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today." So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."

Many thanks to Gary Thompson and his son for fixing the outside door to the elevator. It is not a permanent fix, but it is much better!

- Parking lot will be in use September 24. A neighbor is having a wedding reception at his home, and asked to use the parking lot for guests. He is making a donation to the church as payment.
- The Boy Scout Court of Honor was moved to October 9. Jessie Kubuske will act as the church's representative.
- Mary-K had several concerns, trustees are investigating.

- Arthur Diaz donated an upright piano to the church, and paid to have it moved. It was delivered and put in place on Tuesday, September 13. It was decided to order a plaque to put on the piano to recognize the donation. (Gold Star Trophies in Elyria)
- The cranks on some of the preschool windows were not working. 8 new cranks were purchased and 6 placed with 2 remaining. Parts for the church mower were also purchased at this time.
- Roof repair has been completed.
- Trustees Gary Thompson and Edgar Vargas moved furniture downstairs into the new 'Brides Room''.
- With the new piano in the Fireside room, choir can practice in there, so the trustees will begin using part of the choir room.
- The balcony table for the tech team was completed by Geoff Gatz and is in use.
- The Boy Scout Mum pick up in the parking lot on Tuesday, September 13 was completed and went smoothly.
- Trustees helping set up the outdoor service should be there around 9:20 on Sunday.
- Jim will contact Callahan electric about the outside light that is on at the wrong time.
- The preschool has purchased portable air conditioners for their rooms. They will vent out the windows using a plexiglass insert where the screen would be in one window. This will allow the window to close when air conditioner is not in use. Waiting on the plexiglass to be cut.
- Geoff and Linda Gatz and Gary Thompson cleaned up and made the south front door available for use.

Next Meeting Thursday, October 13, 2022.

Jim Kubuske commented that the plexiglass for the preschool windows has been ordered to replace the window screens when the portable air conditioners are being used.
