# THE KEY

"And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the **KEYS** of the Kingdom of Heaven." — MATTHEW 16:18-19



hen in it comes to celebrating Holidays in February, most people think of Valentine's Day, and President's Day. While the later is just another Monday off, as well as a time of retail sales, Valentine's Day is a time to celebrate love, and eat chocolate! But there's another even more important Holiday in February this year, and that is February 22, Ash Wednesday. Generally, Ash Wednesday in our tradition, that is—the Protestant tradition, has never had the same power or importance as our brothers and sisters in the Catholic tradition, but it should.

Ash Wednesday, a day in which we receive the mark of ashes in the form of a cross on our foreheads as a symbol of our Penitence—which is the act of showing remorse, sorrow, and regret for our actions. Imagine that -a holiday in which we acknowledge our regret? The importance of saying "I'm sorry," should never be

underestimated. As children we learn the importance of apologizing daily, as teachers and parents told us to —"Tell your sister, brother, other you're sorry!" It's possible, depending on the situation for which you were being asked to apologize, that you weren't sorry at all. "They had it coming!" "I told them not to do that!" Learning to not just say you're sorry, but to be sorry is maturity.

Psychologists and Therapists encourage us to not take responsibility for other's feelings. In other words, your feelings are your own. I'm not responsible for how you're feeling. Academically, I can understand that thought that you are responsible for your own feelings, but there are nuances to consider. For example, if I accidentally step on your toe, and it hurts you, then I'm responsible. If I yell at you, and criticize you, and

then you feel threatened and upset, then I'm responsible. As a pastor, when I meet with couples about to be married, I instruct the groom to remember how important it is to say I'm sorry. In fact, I tell them if they want to have a happy marriage to tell their wives, "I'm sorry, honey, I'm an idiot!" I say it for the humor, but there is significant truth in the practice of acknowledging a wrong, even if unintended.

As human beings we all make mistakes. The practice of being penitent, to be sorry for our mistakes, with the hope of making things right, is an important part of practicing our faith. We accept Jesus as our savior and our sins are forgiven, but we still need to take responsibility for our actions if we want to live in a more loving and healthy community. With that in mind, I hope and pray that you will consider joining us for our Ash Wednesday service at 7 pm, on February 22nd. We will receive the mark of the ashes in the form of a cross on our foreheads and hear the word's. "Ashes to ashes, and dust to dust, from the dust we were born, and to the dust we will return."

There are a lot of fun holidays during a year, but Ash Wednesday, while not fun, is of vital importance. On February 14th, Valentine's Day, we say "I love you!" But, on Ash Wednesday, we say, "I love you, and I'm sorry." Ash Wednesday also begins the season of Lent, which is a time for reflection and thought about our actions and our desire to be more like Jesus. Lent, which is simply an Old English word for spring, is a period of growth, although, like our spring season, the growth will not be witnessed until the glory of Easter—for the growth occurs in the dust from which new life will flow. Ashes to ashes, and dust to dust! New Life is coming.

### FEBRUARY SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

#### 2/5 Matthew 5:13-20

"You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot. "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

#### 2/12 Matthew 5:21-37

"You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell. "It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

"Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one.

#### 2/19 Matthew 17:1-9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Get up and do not be afraid." And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, "Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."

#### 2/22 Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21 Ash Wednesday

"Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. "So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

#### 2/26 Matthew 4:1-11

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live

2022 income was up compared to last year, and expenses were down. We still had a year-end deficit of \$71,743 but it was improved from last year's deficit of \$112,000.

Total income for the year was \$169,808. Total expenses for the year were \$241,552.

#### **Trustee Report: Trustees Minutes 1/12/23**

**In attendance:** Jim Kubuske, Don Krucek, Pastor Chris Buckingham-Taylor, Christine Burman

Outside wreath went up in November, and was taken down in January.

The 4th Boy Scout Eagle Court of Honor was held in January.

Trustees' year-end report was completed and handed in on January 11, 2023.

Rumpke picked up their garbage bins. There is no more recycling. Discussion was raised about whether to lock the bin or not. It was decided to not lock it. Pastor will unlock it and store the lock in the office.

Light over the front of the parking lot is out. It needs to be looked into.

#### **Preschool grant:**

- ◆ The plans need to be filed with the city.
- Most of the work will be done when school is not in session. Purchases need to be made and receipts submitted in May.
- Bids will be placed on file for: electrical work, plumbing, and painting.

Preschool Grant: Building repair portion will be overseen by church council. They will obtain bids and ensure that we are in compliance with Amherst City rules and with the specifics of the grant. One bid has been obtained. Second and third bids are anticipated within a week. The city will require registered contractors, an electrician will be required to install GFI units for the touchless faucets, a plumber is recommended because of unforeseen problems due to the age of the building. Some of the work will have to be done while school is in session because of the grant schedule. Emergency council sessions and/or executive sessions will probably be needed to expedite the overall process. Some of the specific funds might need to be

redirected if additional work is found to be required. The grant requires work to be completed by June 30, and final reports filed by July 31.

#### Pastor's Report

Council retreat is scheduled for Feb. 18, 9-Noon, Fellowship Hall. Some topics will be on council's recognized issues, finding mental health relief from the stress of recent times, finding common ground, and adapting to changing times. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on Feb. 22. Pastor may base theme for Lent on finding common ground.

#### Financial Secretary's Report

Cash offerings for the month of December 2022 were \$20,371. Christmas Eve offerings were \$5,031. Cash offerings for the total year of 2022 were \$222,285.

#### **Spiritual Life Report**

Joan Whitman reported no meeting for January due to her illness. The excellent crew continued the work in spite of her absence. No report for this month, but will have one for next month. Ongoing work includes cards and visitations and blankets to shut-ins, 24 blankets to cancer center patients. Pam Miskov was recognized and thanked for her numerous continuing acts of kindness in support of both Compassionate Care and Spiritual Life.

#### Altar Guild Report

Thanks to Geoff Gatz for locating, and Christine Burman for obtaining a new Christmas tree, which will be much easier to handle compared to the old tree. Altar Guild will pay for it from their budget. They will try to find a home for the two remaining trees. Sue Conkle commented that Amherst Historical Society is seeking used Christmas decorations, and so they might be interested. Finally, Altar Guild will coordinate Easter plans with Pastor Chris.

#### Circle Six Report

They are hosting a presentation March 15 on the Shroud of Turin. It will be held in the church sanctuary and is open to the public, donations encouraged.

#### **Tech Report**

Two major technical problems affected our Zoom broadcast recently: in one instance we lost contact with Zoom due to a situation originating with Spectrum; the other instance involved an update by Zoom which caused a temporary loss in the broadcast of music before we became aware of it. Both problems have now been resolved.

Mary-K edits each broadcast and re-posts them again on Facebook and YouTube. This allows us to monitor the number of viewers for each broadcast. For the month of December there were 104 views of our combined broadcasts. The Christmas Eve broadcast had 43 viewers (pre-recorded, no live service).

A new activity is "A Minute with Pastor Chris", where Mary-K takes one minute of clips from his sermon and posts the video on St. Peter's Facebook page, on YouTube, and on her own personal Facebook page. This creates more positive exposure for our church. The results will be multiplied if we all view these videos and share them, thus exposing more people.

Zoom broadcast problems are frequently aggravated due to the physical separation between the video portion of the broadcast (upstairs in balcony) and the audio portion (downstairs main floor) because communication between the two is difficult. Ideally, both audio and video should be located together, which may or may not be practical in our sanctuary. The situation will be studied.

#### **Garden Club**

They are currently "in hibernation" for the winter. Activities will resume in the spring.

#### **Old Business**

Church council is studying the grant and the building improvements.

#### **New Business**

The recently refurbished piano looks beautiful again, thanks to Geoff & Linda Gatz and Brian Schieferstein. We wish to keep it that way as much as possible. Jennifer Wasilk, a frequent user of the piano, will work with Kaye Koler and Terri Walter to investigate the possibilities and recommend a cover that will protect it without discouraging its use.

#### MOTION TO ADJOURN WAS MADE, SECONDED, AND PASSED.

Pastor Chris gave the closing prayer and the meeting adjourned at 8:03 PM.
