Dear St. Peter's People,

My first month of ministry at St. Peter's has flown by and I am still trying to gather my wits. The sheer exhaustion of moving and getting acquainted with a new home, community, church and area, takes a toll, and yet, I am reminded of one of my favorite scriptures —Psalm 121:

> "I lift up my eyes to the hillswhere does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth."

Somehow, in-spite of how tired and weary we may be, the Lord always provides us with new life and energy.

Perhaps, as I am, you too, are feeling energized and excited for our new ministry at St. Peter's UCC? I have just celebrated twenty-five-years of ordained ministry and have always relied on the summer season as a time for God to renew my strength. I have also found that, in general, the church's schedule slows down during the summertime, and that most members take the much deserved and needed time off for themselves to allow God to renew their strength, as well.

Although summer can be a time for churches to slow down and take a breath, many churches continue at a frenzied pace as they welcome such summertime activities as VBS, youth retreats, camp ministry, and mission trips, as examples. I think it is necessary and important to take a spiritual sabbath during the summer. That does not mean that the church should shut down in the summer, but rather-it suggests that we should intentionally use the summer as a time for God to renew our strength as we prepare for the year of ministry ahead.

Pacing ourselves, and catching our breath, are especially important after this last year. COVID 19 has been a huge drain on our energies as individuals, communities, churches and countries. An often, overlooked part of this feeling of lethargy is because we have been worn down by the fear of the disease itself. Living in a state of constant fear, the fear of contracting the illness or giving it to someone we love, has taken its toll on us. Also, having to wear masks everywhere, to constantly be vigilant with our hand washing and social distancing, took away our energy. We spent a lot of energy having to learn new things and worship in new ways- learning new things



can be exhausting. We had to adapt to technologies that were unfamiliar to some of us just in order to share in worship, or spend time with family, to participate in a bible study or attend a meeting via Zoom. Remember how hard it was to not only enter your first Zoom meeting, but also to figure out how to see everyone who was attending the meeting? Perhaps there were times when you struggled to find the worship service link? Some of us could not adapt to the use of computers, or we did not have strong enough Wi-Fi to participate in online church activities, which led to our feeling more isolated and alone, and contributed to our overall state of lethargy. We need rest and renewal!

And when we are weary and tired and struggle to continue our journey-from where does our strength come? We look to the hills for the strength to continue to answer God's call. With that in mind, as my strength is being renewed by God, and as I too enjoy the warmth and slower (mostly maskless) pace of summer, the Spirit is placing ideas for ministry and outreach in my mind and heart, which I will explore and share with our church leaders as we decide together how best to proceed.

There is much to do, and God has great things in store for St. Peter's UCC, in Amherst, Ohio! But, first, let us pace ourselves and allow our Spirits to be renewed and our strength to be replenished. I truly hope you will have a refreshing summer, and I look forward to all that we will be able to do together as we continue to build God's Kingdom.

Remember, you are loved!

JULY SERMON SCRIPTURE READINGS

7/4 Mark 6:1-13

He left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

7/11 Mark 6:14-29

King Herod heard of it, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him." But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

7/18 Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

7/25 John 6:1-21

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him. Jesus said to Philip. "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.














COMPASSIONATE CARE TEAM

June 21, 2021 Minutes

Visitors: Jessie Kubuske, Rachel Nagy, Wendy Kosakowski, Sharon Thompson President Mary-K Kirsch convened the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. Pastor Chris gave the opening prayer.

Trustees Report

Jim Kubuske previously submitted the Trustees Report, which has been inserted below:

Trustee Meeting 6/17/21

In attendance: Don Kruecek, Jim Kubuske, Edgar Vargas

Old business:

Edgar and the trustees had no repairs this past month.

We were awarded the variance to go ahead with the lighted sign. Process will begin soon.

Griffith Blacktop was given a deposit and will call us with a date to seal and re-line the parking lot.

New Business:

Front door of the church needs to be sanded and varnished. Edgar will get a quote and information from Sherwin Williams, and hopefully the Trustees will be able to complete the job.

The downspout near the garage drains into the basement area and needs to be capped off and detoured into the lot. Edgar will take care of it.

Edgar has given the Trustees a quote of \$955 to clean and wax basement areas vacated by Movement Works. It will include the dance room, dance office/waiting room, classroom, hallway and bathroom. It will also include steam cleaning the carpet in the yoga room. (Jim Kubuske asked if he could approve the charges for cleaning the floors and Lauri Hubach informed him that if the cost is below \$2,500, he is able to approve the cost.)

Edgar has also given the preschool the same quote of \$955 to clean and wax floors in the preschool rooms. The question was raised if the preschool pays, or we share that expense with the preschool?

It should be noted that the Trustees are not responsible for turning on the air conditioning, opening windows,

and turning on fans before or during the church service. That is the job of the ushers/deacons.

(Mary-K noted that before church Brian Schieferstein opens the windows and Mary-K helps Brian close the windows after the service.)

Also, the Trustees would like to ask that the monthly calendars be replaced outside the administrative office so that services can be scheduled and they know what church events they need to avoid interrupting with any repairs and work. Return of the calendars was approved.

Next trustee meeting will be July 15 at 6:30 pm on Zoom.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Trustees Report. The motion was passed.

Financial Secretary's Report

Becky Woods gave the Financial Secretary's Report. Offerings for the month of May were \$14,449.26. Also received was a donation of \$20,000 to St. Peter's from Marge Marshall's estate. Marge's family also requested that a picture of Jesus, also donated, be hung with a plaque underneath commemorating Marge and Warren Marshall's work with the Church's youth. Jim Kubuske stated he would order the plaque. Becky also indicated that Marge's family would like to know how the \$20,000 donation would be used within the church. Tom Hollstein indicated that Marge should get recognition for the donation. Lauri Hubach and Kaye Koler will work together to get the details and thank you published in "The Key." A motion to accept the Financial Secretary Report was made, seconded, and passed.

Lauri Hubach gave the Treasurer's Report.

A motion to accept the Treasurer's Report was made, seconded, and passed. A motion to approve the Pass Throughs was made, seconded, and passed.

Media Grant

St. Peter's had applied to the UCC for a media grant for \$5,000. Mary-K announced that our request for the grant had been approved today. The grant will be used to purchase a 75-80"+ screen TV for the sanctuary and for other uses, a cart to roll the TV around, and secure storage for the TV. A committee composed of Brian Schieferstein, Mary-K Kirsch, possibly a Trustee, and Pastor Chris will coordinate the purchase of these items.

Preschool Budget

Wendy Kosakowski presented the preschool budget for 2021/2022. After discussion of the proposed budget a few revisions were made to the hourly wages paid to the preschool staff. A motion to accept the revised preschool budget for 2021/2022 preschool school year was made, seconded, and passed.

Lauri indicated that the PPP forgiveness (\$26,900) and the economic disaster loan (\$7,000) were split between the preschool and the Church—\$14,095 was allotted to the preschool and \$19,805 was allotted to the Church.

Outside Services

Pastor Chris discussed the possibility of having outside services, in conjunction with other churches, the Sunday of the Wooly Bear Festival, which would be the first Sunday in October. He also proposed having the third Sunday of each month, starting on 7/18/21, as an outside service in either the parking lot or another location on the property.

Installation of Pastor Chris

Sunday, September 19, 2021 will be installation day for Pastor Chris with Nayiri Karjian, Association General Minister, Living Water Association, officiating.

Categorization of Membership Status

Sharon Thompson brought up the work being done by her group to recategorize membership status based on our re-

cent congregational meeting to establish voting membership status. Mary-K indicated that the executive council members were in agreement with the information that Sharon had submitted via email on 6/11/21.

Blessing of Animals

Pastor Chris announced that he will be doing a "Blessing of Animals" on the first Saturday in October. It will be held outdoors, weather permitting, or held in the Chapel if the weather is uncooperative.

Scholarship Documentation

Jean Swift asked Mary-K how long scholarship applications should be kept, since she is doing a review of those files. Lauri Hubach suggested that scholarship applications and documentation be kept for the last 7 years. Mary-K will relay this information to Jean.

Covid Protocols

Mary-K Kirsch distributed to council members a link to the CDC website outlining considerations for events and gatherings, to review recommendations on promoting healthy behaviors that reduce spread, and risk factors for large gatherings. Currently, both the CDC and the State of Ohio recommend wearing masks at services.

Since the weather is warmer, the air conditioning units will be turned on prior to Sunday services to cool down the sanctuary. Just prior to starting the services, the A/C will be turned off, the windows will be opened and the ceiling fans will be used. Vaccinated attendees will not be required to wear a mask. Unvaccinated attendees will be asked to wear a mask. Social distancing protocols for seating will remain in effect. Families will not have to socially distance themselves in seating arrangements. Soft singing will be allowed with masks. For now, the hymnals will not be used. The front doors of the church will be opened for entrance and exit. We should continue to keep social distance at the end of the service. Fellowship time should take place outside at the end of the church service. Mary-K will do a "One Call" to let the congregation know about these changes and that we are actively reviewing and considering loosening Covid restrictions.

Fellowship Hall Rental

Jim Kubuske asked if we were able to rent Fellowship Hall. He had a request from Shelley Harmych's niece to rent the hall on 6/26/21. Shelley would open the church for the group, monitor the activities, and close the church. The rental fee is \$250 plus a \$50 refundable deposit after final clean up of the activities. The basic rental fee is for four hours with a fee of \$50 for each additional hour.

A motion was made to adjourn the meeting. It was seconded and passed.

Pastor Chris gave the closing prayer. The meeting adjourned at 8:47 pm.


