6/6 Mark 3:20-35

... and the crowd came together again, so that they could not even eat. When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, "He has gone out of his mind." And the scribes who came down from Jerusalem said, "He has Beelzebul, and by the ruler of the demons he casts out demons." And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables, "How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come. But no one can enter a strong man's house and plunder his property without first tying up the strong man; then indeed the house can be plundered.

"Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven for their sins and whatever blasphemies they utter; but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an eternal sin" for they had said, "He has an unclean spirit."

Then his mother and his brothers came; and standing outside, they sent to him and called him. A crowd was sitting around him; and they said to him, "Your mother and your brothers and sisters are outside, asking for you." And he replied, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" And looking at those who sat around him, he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

6/13 Mark 4:26-34

He also said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

6/20 Mark 4:35-41

On that day, when evening had come, he said to them, "Let us go across to the other side." And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. A great windstorm arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped. But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him up and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. He said to them, "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?"

6/27 Mark 5:21-43

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live."

So he went with him. And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?'" He looked all around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

If the weather is so inclement that even the gazebo won't help, we will be back in the sanctuary, and have grab and go after the service.

President Mary-K Kirsch opened the meeting at 7:02 p.m. emphasizing our core values and that we will open future meetings by reinforcing our core values.

Trustees Report

Jim Kubuske verbally gave the Trustees Report. That report, previously provided via email, is inserted below:

Trustees Meeting 5/13/2021

In Attendance: Jim Kubuske, Head Trustee, Edgar Vargas, Don Krucek

Old Business:

▶ Doug Haney was to pick up tents from church for use with charity. Not sure when he will return them.

• Edgar replaced the toilet flapper in the basement women's restroom as it was leaking.

• Edgar trimmed bushes and spread mulch. People have been donating mulch for this use.

• Edgar helped Diane Barnam move the donated clothes during the last week of April.

▶ Movement Works has moved out. Jim Kubuske and Shelley Harmych did a walk through with Jess Weidner and received keys. Jess will be refunded \$115. (She paid \$150 a month, and had pre-paid for May, \$150/30 days = \$5 per day. She had possession for 7 days. 7days x \$5 = \$35, \$150 - \$35 is \$115.) She will be refunded the money and she asked for a lock from a cabinet that she had purchased. All will be mailed to her.

▶ Electric sign: Church is not in the historic district, so we don't need that type of variance, but because we are in a residential area, we need a residential variance. Wagner Signs is working on the variance, and the

hearing is May 26 at 6:30 p.m. It was decided that the sign will change every 30 seconds, and if necessary, hours will be from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. Sign automatically dims at sunset. Wagner is asking that one or possibly two people be in charge of programming. Trustees decided that the Administrative Assistant and 1 other would be trained.

New business:

Sue Conkle and Becky Woods have asked to start a "Garden Club" whose purpose would be to clean up the flower beds around the church and upkeep on them. Edgar was asked if this infringed on his work, and he said it did not. The Trustees decided that the "club" needs to make sure that they get approval before planting or making changes. They will ask for 48 hours notice. Edgar said they can use his big black garbage bags.

Shelley Harmych fixed the Sanctuary Flag Pole. She screwed the Eagle back on.

There are new Lowe's cards on file in the church office.

Trustees would like to ask the council about Edgar cleaning the basement floor. The floors need to be stripped and waxed, and the carpet cleaned after Movement Works moves out.

Geisel Heating-Air Conditioning will be at the church on May 18, 2021 to inspect the A/C units.

Next meeting: June 17, 2021.

Discussions will include: Sanding the front doors, parking lot blacktopping, and the chimney repair.

The council discussed the re-sealing and striping of the church parking lot. Jim presented two bids: Tiger Striping, \$3,914 and Griffith Paving, \$3,972. After discussion the council decided to accept Griffith's bid, since they had done the original paving. A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept Griffith Paving's bid.

Financial Secretary's Report

Becky Wood gave the Financial Secretary's Report. Total amount received in April was \$13,773.89. We received \$1,363.00 for the stained glass windows account. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the Financial Secretary's Report.

Treasurer's Report

Lauri Hubach gave the Treasurer's report for April 2021.

We will be able to begin gathering at 9:00 a.m. Church services, led by Pastor Chris, will start at 10:00 a.m. After the service, there will be a breakfast buffet with muffins, donuts, etc. The gathering will end by 1:00 p.m. If there is inclement weather, the church service will be held at St. Peter's, Amherst with refreshments, as previously listed, afterward. Church Covid protocols will be followed.

Covid Protocols Through the Summer
